
BOOK CLUB PACKET

Thanks for buying, or bullying your loved ones into buying, *From the Campaign Trail or Thereabouts*. If you read the entire book, or flipped through it and have great inductive reasoning skills, you'll know that the novel is part satire, part romp, and wholly the ravings of self-indulgent lunatics. Hopefully, you also thought it was a lot of fun.

The way book clubs usually work, we hear, is that you read the book, and then you ask some questions about it, and talk about the questions, and somebody (usually Beth) always ducks their turn to bring the wine and cheese.

We love the idea of several people sitting around and actually discussing what we tried to talk about in this novel, so we wrote some questions to help get you started. And we promise that none of them use words like "problematize" or "deconstruct," which we consider quite the personal feat, given we both went to grad school. We've also included a few wacky games, which will only make sense if you've read the book, so you should definitely do that (looking at you, Beth).

We hope these questions and activities give you a springboard to have some fun discussion about the Carlyles and American politics and culture, or at least allow you to pass the time until Beth leaves and you can finally just be *honest*. Discussion Questions

Pattie and Harold's marriage is troubled when we meet them in the novel, and Pattie seems to be ambivalent about its future—and her husband—throughout. Why do you think she stays with him?

Do you think their problems stem from who Pattie and Harold are as individuals, or do you think there are ways that the society in which they live contributes to or creates the conditions for their problems?

Harold and Pattie encounter a fair amount of racism and prejudice during their trip around America. Considering the people they meet and how they view them, does it seem like Harold and Pattie have views on race that are any more informed by actual relationships with other races?

Do you see Harold and Pattie's stated views on race as serving a function? Where in the novel do you see racial attitudes that aren't reflexive, or which aren't a means to make the white speaker feel better about him or herself?

In what ways does Harold strike you as being *sui generis*, and in what ways do you think he reflects broader currents in American society? Does there seem to be a relationship between the former and the latter? If so, what could we infer from it?

Where do you see examples of "con men" in the novel? What do you think about the ways the novel portrays them? Does the novel make a moral judgment about them?

Harold has an unusual take on what's required of him as a reporter, and we see several other depictions of journalists in the novel. How would you compare and contrast Harold with his colleagues? Are their presentations of the campaign and the candidates more nuanced or accurate? If not, do you think they share similar blind spots as Harold?

Where do you see privilege operating in the novel? How do you see it operating? Do you see instances in which hard work and dedication eclipse background and pedigree? How flexible are socioeconomic divides in the novel?

Think about Harold and Pattie's argument at the presidential debate in St. Louis. Do you think Harold has a point about class and background? How much of success, in your opinion, is rooted in appearance and pedigree?

How is whiteness defined by a sense of victimhood within Trumpism? Where do you see examples of that in the text? In your opinion, is this sense of victimhood a feature of white privilege?

Hillary Clinton never appears in the novel. In what ways does the novel's portrayal of Hillary Clinton offer insight into the real-life public narrative that developed around her campaign? Do you think there's a connection between that distance and the way women were contemplated and discussed in the campaign? If so, how do you see that play out in the novel's version of reality? If not, why?

Which echo chambers do you see in the novel? Do you see them on both sides of the political spectrum? Is each echo chamber equally problematic to you?

Think about Pattie's emotional diatribe on election night. What do you think the lessons are from 2016, if anything?

Does the novel present Donald Trump as a reflection or the cause of the misogyny, racism, and anger depicted throughout?

Of the Americans Harold and Pattie encounter during their travels, which strike you as being the most "human?" Which ones strike you as being props or foils?

Similarly, the novel depicts a number of public figures. Which representations do you see as broader than others? For the broad representations, how do the absurd elements of their characters speak to a critique of the real-life public figures? Do any presentations seem more nuanced to you? If so, how do they affect your impression of the novel's world?

The novel is somewhere between a satire and a farce—but are there any moments you find affecting or moving? If so, how does that affect your reading of the novel as a whole?

How would you feel if you were Pattie?
